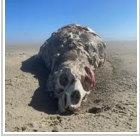

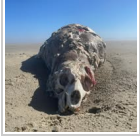

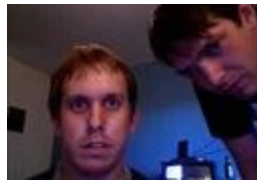


“ *Happy birthday, Brian. Thank you for being mine and Ben's first and best friend in Seattle. It's hard to believe that was over two decades ago.*

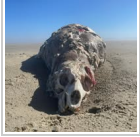


“ Brian was so richly creative. He had a great talent in music . He was very kind and peaceful.
